Good Shepherd Friends,

Are you tired of hearing campaign ads? They are usually negative and often based on fear, which can raise our anxiety level. Some even hold up as values things that are not Christian values. In the coming days, we are encouraged to vote to elect people to serve in National, State, and local public offices. It is important that we choose our elected officials very carefully. Truthful information about the candidates is sometimes hard to come by, by we must do our best to learn about what is true about each candidate.

We have a lot to think about before we cast our ballots in the coming days. Are you taking your votes seriously? I encourage you to consider these questions when making your choices:

- 1. What are you looking for in the candidates?
- 2. What qualities are you looking for?
- 3. What values do they live by?
- 4. What are the policy positions that they support and what do you think about their policy positions? What do you think Jesus would think about their policy positions?

As Christians, the values of Jesus must be our values. We must work to build up the Kingdom of God, which Jesus announced and lived out; a Kingdom in which love, compassion, kindness, mercy, and equity are a priority. To build such a Kingdom, to live as Jesus lived, and to love as Jesus loved, we need competent leaders who will help us become more loving, compassionate, kind, merciful, and equitable.

This isn't always easy to do when we are bombarded by attack ads, half-truths, and outright lies. As best as you can, learn the truth about the positions of each candidate, but be careful about the sources of information you find or are sent to you. Pray about your decision. Consider how each candidate could help us build the Kingdom of God that Jesus announced. Then vote.

And remember, the day after the election, no matter who wins, the sun will rise in the east and the earth will continue on its journey around the sun. We may be disappointed, or we may celebrate. But regardless of the outcome, God will not abandon us. Together, with God's help, we will continue our work of building the Kingdom of God, loving as Jesus taught us to love. No one can stop us from following the true Way of Jesus, the Way of Love.

This Sunday is **Good & Green Sunday!** Please remember to bring in your cans, bottles and sneakers so we can continue our fundraising efforts for our sustainable initiatives.

THERE IS NO GOOD & GREEN TEAM MEETING THIS SUNDAY! Some of us met last Sunday with our counterparts at St. Mary's Barnstable and learned about new ideas we can do to follow the path to Creation Justice. More about that in coming weeks. As an example of what we have learned, Scooter Holcombe put together these ideas of how to observe a safe and sustainable Halloween for our furry friends pets/animals. More info on sustainable Halloween efforts are on our bulletin boards and our web page.

Tips for keeping Halloween safe for our furry friends:

Make sure candy wrappers are disposed of properly. They not only trash the neighborhood but may be ingested by wildlife.

- 1. Pick up any candy that may be dropped. Our furry friends don't need the extra sugar and some ingredients may be toxic to animals. Remember, things like chocolate and raisins are not only toxic to our dog pets but also to wild dogs like coyotes, foxes, etc.
- 2. Enjoy your Halloween decorations safely. Make sure that deer antlers and small necks and limbs are not in danger of getting tangled in strands of lights or decorations like spiderwebs etc.
- 3. Be kind to our nocturnal friends and turn off bright or noisy decorations when you go to bed to preserve the night quiet and darkness that they are used to.
- 4. Think globally as well as locally. Palm oil is a common ingredient in many products including candies and chocolates. It's grown in Asia, Africa and Latin America. It's production has some benefits environmentally compared to other oils but increased demand is leading to production processes that promote deforestation and loss of critical habitat for endangered species. Some companies are now committed to using palm oil that is grown using more sustainable practices. And don't worry, it includes well-known companies like Hershey, Mars, and Nestle.
- 5. What should you do with pumpkins after the season? You may want to share them with your wildlife friends but if you do, use best practices and make sure they are free of mold, paint and wax, cut into small pieces and in places that you want the animals to be. If the pumpkin is on the front step, the critters will be there as well. But pumpkins are not hedgehog friendly. While hedgehogs apparently really like pumpkin, too much can easily lead to nutritional imbalance. If you're not sure that you want to risk sharing this tasty treat, composting or donating to a local zoo or wildlife shelter are good alternative ideas.

Sunday School

Sunday School is held during the first half of our 10am Sunday Service on the 1st and 3rd Sunday of the month. The Sunday School is located in the church meeting room, in the office area. All Sunday School volunteers have undergone CORI background checks and received training, including the Safe Church training required by the Episcopal Church for all those who work with children. The Good Shepherd Sunday Nursery

The Good Shepherd Sunday Nursery (for children through kindergarten age) is open during our 10am Sunday Services. Children are most welcome in the church, but the nursery will be available for them as well. Children can arrive at the nursery beginning at 9:50am and the nursery will close 10 minutes after the conclusion of the 10am Service. The Sunday Nursery is located on the third floor of the church, which can be accessed at the top of the church office stairwell in the back of the church building, through the door (marked Sunday Nursery). All nursery volunteers have undergone CORI background checks and received training, including the Safe Church training required by the Episcopal Church for all those who work with children. Mid-Week Eucharist

On Wednesdays at Noon, there is a celebration of the Eucharist in the church, which is open to all. This is an opportunity to gather for prayer and reflection; and be reminded of God's presence between Sundays. For those on your lunch break, the celebration of the mid-week Eucharist is approximately 20 minutes.

Good & Green Team

Every month, on the 3rd Sunday, the Good and Green Team collects 5 cent redeemable cans and bottles along with sneakers to raise money for sustainable efforts in our parish. During the prayers of the people, we pray for "all those whose names have been recorded in the Prayer Request Book."

Sunday Coffee Hour

Every Sunday, following the 10am Sunday Service, coffee hour is held in the Church Hall. Coffee hour is an opportunity for us to further get to know one another and share our lives with one another. The wearing of a facemask is welcome, for those who choose to wear one. Like all other indoor church functions, if you are not feeling well, please do not participate at coffee hour.

Good Shepherd Table

Good Shepherd's Table serves a free in-person meal, which is open to the public, every Thursday at 4:30pm. Takeout meals are available from 4:30-4:45pm for those who choose not to eat indoors with others. Like all other indoor church functions, if you are not feeling well, please do not participate in the Good Shepherd Table indoor dining.

Food Pantry Schedule

The Food Pantry is open on the First Tuesday of the month from 3-6pm. People can pick up food from the Food Pantry one time per month.
